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Special Trumbull Police Commission Meeting October 23, 2025 MINUTES

The Trumbull Police Commission meeting was called to order at 3:40 p.m. with the recitation of the pledge and moment of silence for deceased and injured police officers and emergency personnel.

New Business

Recognition of Officer James Sota

Chief Lombardo gave an overview of a recent incident wherein Off. James Sota employed a LifeVac device to save a choking baby. He congratulated and thanked Officer Sota for his fine work.

State Representative David Rutigliano presented Off. Sota with a citation thanking him for his heroism.

Grievance 25-06 and Employment Separation

Floyd Dugas provided Commissioners with a handout and reviewed the timeline of Sgt. Hadden's attendance and duty status since his injury on February 20, 2024. He also went over Article 36, Section 9 of the collective bargaining

agreement (CBA) as it pertains to Sgt. Hadden's situation. Mr. Dugas gave the opinion that it is mandatory that Sgt. Hadden be separated from his employment as per the CBA.

Mr. Dugas asked Chief Lombardo to relay what occurred at his meeting of August 6, 2025 with Sgt. Hadden. Chief Lombardo said that Sgt. Hadden was advised that unless a doctor's note releasing him to full duty was provided, he (Chief Lombardo) would have no choice but to ask the Commission to separate Sgt. Hadden from his employment, as per Article 36, Section 9 of the CBA. On further questioning from Mr. Dugas, Chief Lombardo stated that Sgt. Hadden has not worked in the capacity of Patrol Sergeant since February 20, 2024. Chief Lombardo also said that the Police Department does not have any permanent light duty jobs. He also answered Mr. Dugas' question regarding overtime incurred, stating that some shifts were backfilled with overtime because of Sgt. Hadden's status.

Stephen Egan addressed the Commission, stating that the CBA does not take workers' comp or ADA laws into account. He pointed out that Sgt. Hadden has been working, although light duty, and he asked the Commission to give Sgt. Hadden another month to obtain a doctor's release to full duty.

Mr. Dugas argued against an extension, stating that the contract language is clear.

Michael Hillis, representing Sgt. Hadden, addressed the Commission. He stated that he disagrees with the Commission's interpretation of the CBA. He asked Chief Lombardo if Sgt. Hadden is filling a job slot. Chief stated that Sgt. Hadden is functioning in his position, but not at full capacity.

Mr. Hillis said that Sgt. Hadden's ADA claim requires a process, and he said that because Sgt. Hadden is willing to work, he should be accommodated. He noted that 90 days from the 18-month mark have not elapsed yet, and he mentioned that there is still an active workers' compensation claim. He said that Chief Lombardo could choose to create a light duty position. Mr. Hillis asked Chief Lombardo if there is any problem with Sgt. Hadden's work ethic or attitude, and Chief Lombardo said there is no problem. Mr. Hillis also asked Chief Lombardo if there have been any complaints about Sgt. Hadden from other officers, and Chief Lombardo replied that he is not aware of any such complaints.

Chairman Baldwin asked if ADA claims pertain to police departments, and Mr. Dugas replied that the law does not require the department to provide a permanent light duty position.

Mr. Hillis interjected that at least a temporary light duty offering should be made, pending the resolution of Sgt. Hadden's workers' compensation claim, and he asked the Commission to consider this.

Mr. Dugas read the grievance and said the Commission should make a decision.

Motion by Vice Chairman Magliocco, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to enter executive session. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried. The three Police Commissioners and Thomas McCarthy entered executive session at 4:10 p.m.

Motion by Vice Chairman Magliocco, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to come out of executive session. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried. All came out of executive session at 4:21 p.m.

Motion by Vice Chairman Magliocco, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to deny grievance 25-06 at step 2. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Motion by Chairman Baldwin, seconded by Vice Chairman Magliocco to approve Sgt. Hadden's separation from employment, effective immediately, as recommended by Chief Lombardo and in accordance with Article 36 of the CBA. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Public Comment

No members of the public were present to speak.

Approval of Minutes

Motion by Vice Chairman Magliocco, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to approve the September 9, 2025 Police Commission meeting minutes. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

New Business

Discussion and consideration of traffic impact of proposed 48-unit residential development at 2105 and 2125 Reservoir Avenue

Rob Librandi advised the Commission that 2105-2125 Reservoir Avenue, LLC will come before the Planning and Zoning Commission on November 19, 2025 regarding their proposed 48-unit apartment building at 2105 and 2125 Reservoir Avenue. Chairman Baldwin asked how many parking spaces were being proposed, and Mr. Librandi did not have the exact figure available. Vice Chairman Magliocco asked if there would be a sidewalk connecting Lindeman Drive to this property. Rob Librandi said that is an issue for the Planning and Zoning Commission, and they could choose to require a sidewalk.

Kermit Hua of KWH Enterprises, LLC presented his traffic study to the Commission. He stated that the site is projected to generate 19 and 24 vehicular trips during the respective weekday morning and weekday afternoon peak hours. He noted

that there will be one driveway in and out of the site. He also mentioned that the number of accidents in the area have been quite low, and he does not foresee this development causing traffic congestion.

Vice Chairman Magliocco suggested that the Planning and Zoning Commission consider requiring sidewalks.

Motion by Commissioner Trefz, seconded by Vice Chairman Magliocco to approve the proposed plan for a 48-unit apartment building at 2105 and 2125 Reservoir Avenue with a sidewalk requirement to be considered by Planning and Zoning. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Little Barn gift cards

Vice Chairman Magliocco announced that Michael Fedell, the owner of Little Barn Restaurant, once again presented him with gift cards to be distributed to all employees of the Trumbull Police Department and all Trumbull Police Commissioners in appreciation for all that they do.

Discussion and consideration of traffic impact of proposed 150-unit residential development at 2135, 2145, and 2155 Reservoir Avenue

Vice Chairman Magliocco left the meeting room and recused himself from this agenda item. Luke Mauro of Solli Engineering representing Vessel Technologies presented his report for this proposed development. He provided data which concluded that the project would not have a significant impact on traffic in the area. He acknowledged concerns regarding the traffic impact of this development combined with other developments in the area, but

maintained that traffic will remain below the acceptable threshold for a two-lane road. He noted that concerns about the fire department's access to the property have been addressed, and he mentioned that he will also seek the required approval for the project from the State of Connecticut.

Motion by Commissioner Trefz, seconded by Commissioner Fonseca to approve the proposed 150-unit residential development at 2135, 2145, and 2155 Reservoir Avenue. There was no discussion, Chairman Baldwin, Commissioner Fonseca, and Commissioner Trefz voted in favor, Commissioner Magliocco abstained, and the motion carried.

Discussion and consideration of traffic impact of proposed pedestrian crossing between 4 and 9 Trefoll Drive

Vice Chairman Magliocco returned to the meeting. Brian Smith, representing Henkel Corporation, introduced Henkel Facilities Manager Steven Leeper. Mr. Leeper gave a summary of Henkel's business and expansion plans as they relate to Trefoil Drive. Kevin McCutchan of Tighe & Bond then presented the proposed plan noting that the crosswalk would be a raised structure with a flashing beacon. Vice Chairman Magliocco asked if the raised structure would hold up to time, given the fact that large buses and tractor trailers will travel over it, and Mr. McCutchan said that it would. Chief Lombardo advised that the Trumbull Public Works and Engineering Departments are aware of this proposal.

Motion by Vice Chairman Magliocco, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to approve the proposed pedestrian crossing between 4 and 9 Trefoil Drive. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Discussion and consideration of a "Dead End" sign in the area of 17 Greenwood Drive

Chief Lombardo presented a report submitted by Officer Tantimonico recommending a "dead end" sign on Greenwood Drive.

Motion by Commissioner Trefz, seconded by Vice Chairman Magliocco to approve a "dead end" sign on Greenwood Drive. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Approval of the 2026 Police Commission Meeting Schedule

Chairman Baldwin asked that the meeting scheduled for November 10, 2026 be changed to November 17, 2026.

Motion by Commissioner Trefz, seconded by Commissioner Fonseca to approve the 2026 meeting schedule, with November 10, 2026 being changed to November 17, 2026. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Executive session to interview three police officer candidates

Motion by Vice Chairman Magliocco, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to enter executive session to interview three police officer candidates. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried. All four Police Commissioners, Chief Lombardo, Assistant Chief Byrnes, Captain Allen, Lieutenant Coppola, Officer Sota, and Thomas McCarthy entered executive session at 6:35 p.m.

Motion by Commissioner Fonseca, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to come out of executive session. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried. All came out of executive session at 8:05 p.m.

Motion by Chairman Baldwin, seconded by Commissioner Trefz to make a conditional offer of employment to Patrick Eble, with a start date to be determined by Chief Lombardo, subject to satisfactory completion of a physical agility test. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Motion by Chairman Baldwin, seconded by Vice Chairman Magliocco to make a conditional offer of employment to Christopher Ehlers, with a start date to be determined by Chief Lombardo, subject to satisfactory completion of a physical agility test. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Motion by Chairman Baldwin, seconded by Commissioner Fonseca to suspend the correspondence and chief's monthly report agenda items. There was no discussion, all voted in favor, and the motion carried.

Adjourn

On Friday, 12/26/25, while working a special duty detail at Trumbull Mall, Off. Nick Van Fleet and I were on foot patrol near door #4 when we heard a loud commotion of people screaming and yelling, followed by a loud bang resembling a gunshot.

Off. Van Fleet and I immediately began running to the area of the gunshot and observed several people running in multiple directions. A female in the area yelled to us that there was a fight and that "he shot a gun." She was unable to provide a description of the suspect but pointed in the direction of JCPenney, indicating that the shooter had fled that way.

Off. Van Fleet and I continued in that direction to ensure public safety and to locate and neutralize any potential active threat. After determining that there was no active shooter, we returned to the crime scene to identify witnesses, locate evidence, and assist with the ongoing investigation. I would like to formally recognize Off. Van Fleet for his immediate and decisive response. Without hesitation, we ran toward a perceived active threat, demonstrating professionalism, courage, and a clear commitment to public safety.

I would also like to recognize Off. Andrew Goldstein and Dispatcher Pam DeSanty for their outstanding performance during this incident. Off. Goldstein and Dispatcher DeSanty handled multiple 911 calls, routine calls, all TPD radio traffic, the hotline used to request mutual aid from assisting agencies, and routine duties, including coordinating the call-in of off-duty officers. At one point during the incident, dispatcher DeSanty was simultaneously managing three phones while relaying critical information regarding the suspect.

Everyone involved in the incident performed at an exceptionally high level in a rapidly evolving, stressful situation. Their actions are a true testament to the professionalism, courage, and integrity expected of members of this department. I am proud and honored to work alongside each of them.

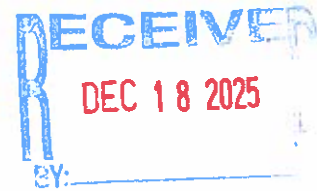
And, I offer this praise with little hope of a resolution to this crime. Thank you all for the effort, not the hopeful outcome. And, Merry Christmas!

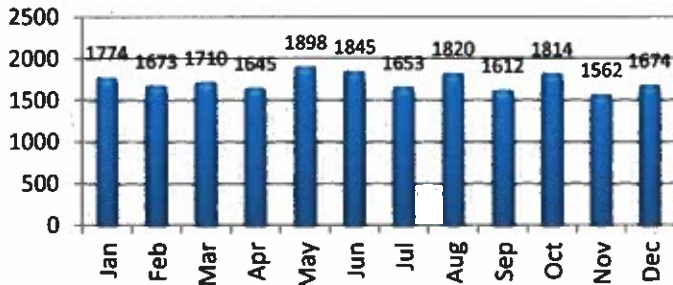

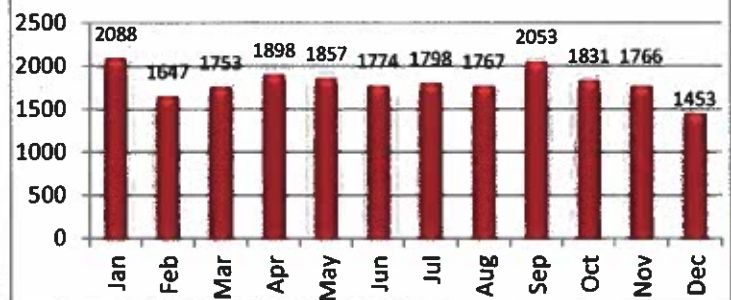

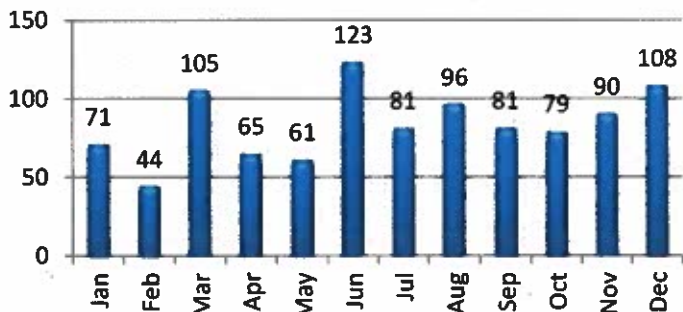

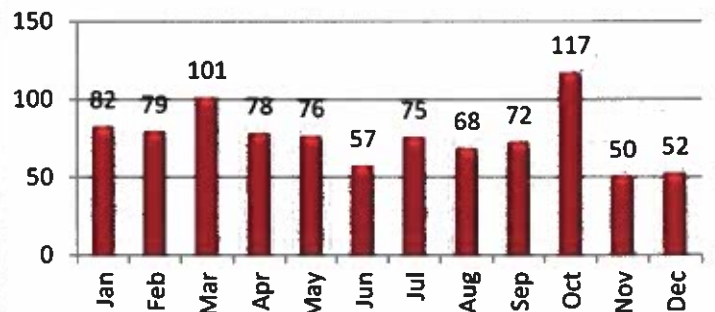

New & Completed Investigations

Gun Shot Wound/ Medical Call - On December 1, 2025, patrol officers responded to 1235 Huntington Turnpike for a report of a person bleeding from the leg. Upon officers and EMS arrival it was determined that the victim had suffered a gunshot wound to the upper thigh. The victim who would not cooperate was transported to the hospital where it was confirmed that he had a bullet lodged in his femur. An investigation determined that the victim had been shot in Bridgeport and all pertinent information was provided to the Bridgeport Police Department.

Stolen Tractor - On December 13, 2025, patrol officers responded to Imperial Court for the report of a stolen tractor (Kubota) valued at \$85,000 that was believed to have been taken off the property the day prior. An investigation and an anonymous tip revealed that the tractor had been placed in a wooded area in an adjacent neighborhood which led to a suspect and the arrest of the individual after a confession was obtained. Approximately a week after the incident was reported the tractor was recovered from the suspect's residence and was arrested the same day by detectives.

Attempt Assault with a Firearm & Fight at Trumbull Mall - On December 26, 2025, the patrol officers and officers working a special assignment/ duty at the Trumbull Mall responded to a shots fired call. It was quickly determined that an unknown masked male had fired one round from a handgun at an intended victim. It was quickly determined after the incident that this was an isolated incident, and a crime scene was established. Video surveillance has revealed that a physical altercation initiated by a group of approximately three (3) juveniles had preceded the shot being discharged from the gun at another juvenile victim that attempted to break up the initial fight. Investigators are continuing to identify all parties involved with an attempt to submit arrest warrants for the parties involved.

Trumbull Mall/ Banter- Piercing Pagoda Smash & Grab - On December 27, 2025, patrol officers responded to the Trumbull Mall for report of a burglary. The Banter- Piercing Pagoda

kiosk was found by Trumbull Mall staff to have been burglarized by smashing the glass cases containing their merchandise. A review of video surveillance was obtained and revealed suspects and a vehicle that were used in theft. Similar suspects and vehicle were used in an earlier burglary/ theft at the CT Post Mall in Milford. The investigation is ongoing.

Trumbull Mall/ Gift Novelties Smash & Grab Attempt – On December 30, 2025, patrol officers responded to the Trumbull for a report of a vandalism. The Gift Novelties kiosk reported that their glass display had broken glass. A review of video surveillance revealed that a masked and gloved suspect entered the mall with a hammer like object striking the glass case over a tarp covering the case in an attempt to steal the merchandise. The suspect makes a couple of attempts of gaining entry and is unsuccessful. Further video surveillance has identified a suspect vehicle and believe approximately three (3) individuals may be involved. The investigation is ongoing.

Detectives Assist Other Agencies

Assist Bridgeport Police Department with Arrest & Search Warrants - On December 5, 2025, detectives assisted the Bridgeport Task Force, along with Connecticut State Police, Bridgeport Narcotics Division, Fairfield Police, and Stamford Police conducted an operation which included a total of 8 search warrants at 6 residences within the city of Bridgeport.

Six suspects were arrested, and the search warrants resulted in officers seizing two Glock handguns, both modified to convert the firearms to fully automatic, a hi-capacity magazine, quantities of crack cocaine, and approximately \$5000.00 US currency.

BRIDGEPORT REGIONAL AUTO THEFT TASK FORCE (November 17 – December 12, 2025)

Firearms & Narcotic Arrest- During the month of November Task Force Officers investigated a suspected convicted felon of selling narcotics. After obtaining multiple search warrants for different locations the suspect was found to be in possession of two (2) firearms, a high-capacity magazine, crack cocaine, and ecstasy pills. The suspect was arrested in charged for the narcotics, and the illegal firearms & magazine.

Home Invasion Arrest- In the month of November Task Force Officers (TFO) learned that a Bridgeport resident was a suspect in a home invasion in New Britian in which the suspect identified himself as a police officer. TFO were able to locate the suspect in the area of the Trumbull Garden Housing Complex on November 17, 2025.

A motor vehicle stop of the suspect was attempted but he fled from officers and then led them on a short foot pursuit where the suspect was taken into custody for the New Britian Police Department.

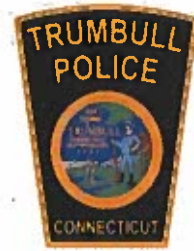

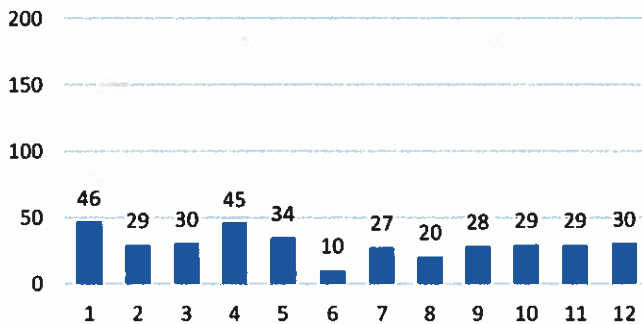

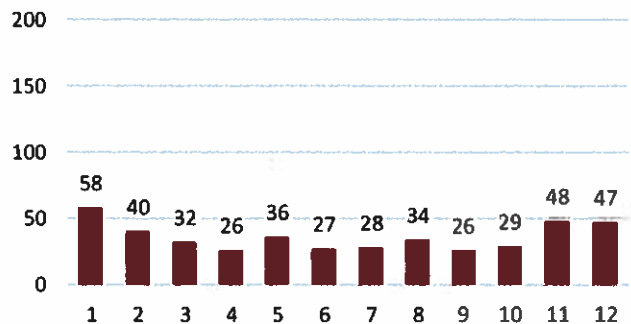

Trumbull Police Department Towing Policy

Effective January 1, 2026

I. PURPOSE

- A. This policy is established by the Trumbull Police Commission to provide for an orderly, efficient and equitable procedure for the towing of vehicles upon request of the Trumbull Police Department within the Town of Trumbull.

II. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- A. Each tow provider shall be required to have, upon the time of application and during its tenure on the tow list:
 - 1. Connecticut Motor Vehicle General Repairer's License pursuant to Connecticut General Statute 14-66, or
 - 2. Connecticut Used or New Car Dealer's License, or
 - 3. Connecticut Limited Repairer's License
- B. The Applicant shall be a citizen of the United States. The Applicant, if applicable shall be current on all taxes due and owing the Town of Trumbull.
- C. Each Applicant shall complete an annual application supplied by the Trumbull Police Department. Each Applicant, including, the owner/operators, directors, officers, shareholders and employees shall consent to a background check to be conducted by the Chief of Police or his designee. The Chief of Police shall report the results of these investigations to the Police Commission for purposes of approving the application. An annual acceptance fee of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) shall be paid by certified or cashier check to the Trumbull Police Department at the time of acceptance.
- D. Acceptance on the Town of Trumbull's tow list shall be for a twelve-month period. The procedure for new applications and annual renewals shall meet the requirements as set forth in this policy.
- E. Each facility shall be required to have a dedicated, secured, inside storage area for the storage of a minimum of four (4) towed vehicles involving Trumbull Police investigations. Each facility shall have a secured inside storage area for fifteen (15) vehicles. Each facility shall have a secured lighted, video-monitored outside storage area for thirty (30) vehicles. These storage areas shall be located on, or adjacent to, the towers' registered place of business. Such place of business shall be located within a eight (8) mile radius of the Trumbull Town Hall at the intersection of Church Hill Road and Main Street (Route 111) and must be in compliance with all applicable state and local laws and regulations.

- F. Vehicles towed shall not be stored or parked upon Town roads or property. Excepted is the Town-owned property for abandoned motor vehicles, to be used only with the permission of the Patrol Shift Supervisor.
- G. Each tow provider shall be required to maintain a sufficient operational capacity to accept and respond to calls from the Trumbull Police Department for towing, including, but not limited to, accidents, abandoned vehicles, parking violations, and service calls.
- H. Each tower shall be required to have qualified tow vehicle operators available to respond to any calls at all times of the day and night under all weather conditions. The tower shall provide written notification to the vehicle owner and/or operator of the location of the vehicle and charges to date with seventy-two (72) hours of towing and storage. The tower shall furnish proof of such notification to the Chief of Police on demand.
- I. Each tower shall procure and maintain in effect the following insurance coverage with insurers licensed or approved to conduct business in the state of Connecticut and holding a current financial rating in the A.M. Best & Company satisfactory to the Town:
 - 1. Commercial General Liability. Insurance against claims or suits brought by members of the public alleging bodily injury, personal injury or damages of property and claimed to have arisen out of operations conducted pursuant to this towing policy. The limits of commercial liability insurance coverage shall be at least in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence with an aggregate of at least one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) and the coverage shall be broad enough to include premises, personal injury, completed operations, contingent liability, contractual liability, fire legal liability and care, custody and control.
 - 2. Business Automobile. Insurance against claims or suits brought by members of the public alleging bodily injury, personal injury or damage of property and claimed to have arisen out of the use of owned, hired or non-owned vehicles in connection with operations under this agreement. Business Automobile limits of liability shall not be less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each occurrence, annual aggregate, bodily injury, personal injury or damage of property.
 - 3. Excess/Umbrella coverage. The tower shall also have an excess umbrella policy in the amount of at least two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) which provides excess insurance in addition to the

insurance coverages provided in Section A Commercial General Liability and Section B. Business Automobile.

4. Worker's Compensation and Employees Liability. Insurance in accordance with the Connecticut General Statutes and Regulations in order to meet the legal obligations towards employees in the event of injury or death sustained in the course of employment. Employers' liability shall not be less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) each claim.

5. Additional Insured. Insurance policies under subsections 1, 2 and 3 of this section shall be endorsed to include the Town of Trumbull and any department or agency of the Town as an additional insured, as their interest may appear.

6. Notice of Cancellation. In the event of nonrenewal or cancellation, tower's insurer shall give written notice to the Town of Trumbull Police Department 158 Edison Road, Trumbull, CT. Attention: Chief of Police, indicating that such cancellation or nonrenewal shall not be effective in less than sixty (60) days from when notice is received by registered mail.

7. Certificate of Insurance. Prior to eligibility to perform towing services hereunder, the tower shall provide a properly authorized certificate of insurance to the Chief of Police evidencing that the foregoing described coverages are in full force and effect. Further, prior to acceptance, the certificate shall clearly show; Description of operations; Location (exact as possible); and Town/Department as additional insured.

- J. Each tower shall agree to indemnify and hold harmless the Town of Trumbull, the Trumbull Police Commission, Trumbull Police Department including all officers, officials, servants agents and employees of the Trumbull Police Department, Town of Trumbull from all claims, expenses, charges, causes of action, suits, defaults or judgments arising from the negligence of the tow operator.
- K. No person or corporation shall be allowed to hold, directly or indirectly, more than one place on the tow list on an annual basis. In applying this prohibition, an individual shall be presumed to hold a place on the tow list whenever he or she, or any member of their immediate family owns an interest in or is employed by any corporation, partnership or business holding a place on the tow list. In the instance of corporations, this requirement shall not be met if more than one entity within a "controlled group or corporations" as defined in Section 1563 of the Internal Revenue Code (26 U.S.C. 1563) is on the list. The Trumbull Chief of Police or his designee may require an entity on the list or any applicant to disclose such information as may be necessary to determine compliance with the requirement.

Failure to provide such information may be the basis for removal from the list or denial of the application for appointment or renewal to the list. An intentional violation of this section may result in the removal of all entities within the controlled group of corporations of the violator. Any adverse determination or presumption by the Chief of Police may be appealed to the Police Commission within twenty-one (21) days of notice of the adverse determination or presumption.

- L. Any change in ownership, registration or license of any facility on the tow list shall be reported in writing to the Town and to the Chief of Police within twenty-four (24) hours of such change.
- M. Each tow provider applying for acceptance on the tow list shall first be inspected by the Chief of Police or his designee. A report and a recommendation on the investigation shall be reviewed by the Chief of Police with the Police Commission. The Chief of Police or his designee shall have the ability to conduct unannounced inspections for purposes of assessing quality control and conformance with the terms of this policy.
- N. The Police Commission reserves the right to limit the number of tow providers on the tow list at any one time based on good cause. Acceptance on the tow list by the Police Commission may in no way be construed to imply an endorsement of the towing facility.
- O. The Police Commission on the anniversary date each year of the establishment of the tow list shall review the tow policy and established tow list and may act upon recommended changes in the policy and/or additions or deletions to the tow list, provided however, that the Police Commission may act upon recommendations for changes in the policy or removal of tow operators from the tow list for good cause at any time.
- P. Failure to submit the information or comply with the requirements of this section may result in the rejection of any application.

III. EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS

- A. Each wrecker shall be equipped according to the Connecticut General Statutes and the Regulations of the Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles including but not limited to the provisions set forth in Connecticut General Statute 14-66. Additionally, each tower shall have a minimum of two (2) wreckers plus two (2) flatbeds licensed and properly insured as required herein.

- B. Each wrecker and flatbed shall be equipped with at a minimum a broom and a shovel, communications equipment, a second rear spotlight and three triangular reflectors.
- C. Each wrecker or flatbed will be lettered on both sides of the vehicle depicting the name of the garage and its telephone number or name of the garage and its address. Lettering will be a minimum of three (3) inches high and will be maintained in clean, legible condition.
- D. No wrecker or flatbed shall tow a vehicle with a gross weight in excess of the boom capacity of the wrecker.
- E. No wrecker or flatbed will be used for towing on the Trumbull tow list unless it has passed an inspection by the State of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles Commercial Vehicles Safety Division and this inspection is up to date and otherwise in compliance with the regulations of the STATE OF CONNECTICUT, DEPARTMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES.
- F. No wrecker or flatbed will be approved or used for towing unless it bears a current wrecker registration in the name of the repair license, or in the name of a leasing company leased in the name of the repair license.
- G. Each wrecker or flatbed will be maintained in good condition and will be subject to inspection at any time by the Trumbull Police Department. Results of any such inspection shall be forwarded to the Chief of Police and if necessary to the State of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles Commercial Vehicles Safety Division to determine whether the wrecker and/or flatbed is in compliance with the applicable regulations of the State of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles.
- H. Any change in ownership or registration on the vehicle shall be reported to the Chief of Police within twenty-four (24) hours. Notification shall be made by certified mail.

IV. OPERATING REQUIREMENTS

- A. All requests for towing or service shall be distributed by the Chief of Police or his designee, with each tower taking its turn in its respective order. In the event that two (2) vehicles at the scene of an accident have to be towed and the next wrecker on the list has two tow trucks currently available, they may be allowed to tow both vehicles. Towers will respond to all calls. Continued no answers, busy signals, or refusals to respond to three (3) calls in a six (6) month period will be the basis for suspension of the facility from the tow list in accordance with Section V. Exception to this section will be upon specific request by the motorist for a special garage within a reasonable distance.

- B. All calls for towing or service shall come from the Trumbull Police Department's current shift's dispatcher. If a tower is unable to handle a call, the call for service may not be delegated by the tower to another wrecker operator. The tower shall be charged for the call and the next wrecker operator on the list will be called.
- C. No tow operator will patrol, chase or solicit tows or repairs within the jurisdiction of the Trumbull Police Department.
- D. No more than one day and one night telephone number may be accepted and they must allow for contact on a 24-hour, seven-day-per-week basis.
- E. Garage owners are responsible for the negligent and careless acts and/or omissions of their agent's servants and/or employees arising out of towing, response, or other department violations. Owners shall provide a list of all wrecker operators with their current, valid Connecticut operator's numbers and notify in writing the Chief of Police of any changes within one week of such change.
 - 1. Each tow operator shall:
 - a. possess a current Connecticut operator's license,
 - b. have no felony convictions,
 - c. be eighteen (18) years of age or older,
 - d. be a competent operator of the tow truck and be knowledgeable with the motor and mechanical features of the tow truck and may be required to demonstrate such skills upon the demand of the Chief of Police or his designee.
- F. Tow operators will be allowed twenty (20) minutes to respond to calls. Failure to respond within twenty (20) minutes after being dispatched by the Trumbull Police Department constitutes a failure to respond for the purposes of suspension or revocation under Section V of this policy. Further, a failure to respond within (20) minutes warrants the Trumbull Police Department to call another wrecker to perform the tow.
- G. Wrecker operators will be as neat and clean as practicable and will conduct themselves in a businesslike manner.
- H. The carrying of firearms is discouraged, however a permit is required. Firearms carried in an exposed manner as to cause alarm to the public may place the permit to carry the weapon in jeopardy and may be cause for removal from the tow list.

- I. Vehicles towed will be taken to the tow operator's registered place of business unless specifically requested by the owner, operator, agent or Police Department's representative to be towed elsewhere.
- J. In the case of an emergency, the Trumbull Police Department's Patrol Shift Supervisor shall have the right to disregard the tow list and obtain the services of the nearest garage.
- K. The tow operator responding to the scene of an accident will be completely responsible for the removal of glass and/or debris from the accident scene. In the event more than one tow operator is called, each shall be responsible. Failure to adhere to this policy shall be the basis of review and suspension of the tow operator from the tow list.
- L. No vehicle will be moved from the scene of an accident except upon approval of the police officer in charge.
- M. The towing facility will have on file with the Trumbull Police Department a current schedule of rates and charges (including storage charges) related to towing operations. The towing facility will not charge a rate higher than that on file with the Police Department for police wrecker calls. Such rates shall not exceed those rates set by the Commissioner of the State Department of Motor Vehicles ("DMV") and shall be posted in conformance with the requirements of DMV at each towing facility and carried upon each wrecker.
- N. The tow facility shall accept payment for towing and/or storage by at least one major credit card.
- O. Service calls such as gas; oil, tire changing, etc. will be handled if possible at the scene without towing the vehicle.
- P. Trumbull police officers at the scene of a tow call who observe unsatisfactory service by a wrecker operator or who receive information concerning unsatisfactory service by a wrecker shall file a written report of such unsatisfactory service with the Chief of Police.

V. SUSPENSION OR REVOCATION

- A. The Chief of Police may, for cause, suspend or revoke from the towing list any tow provider who fails to meet the requirements of this policy or who violates any statute or regulation concerning the operation of a motor vehicle repair, towing or storage facility, or any statute or regulation concerning the operation of a motor vehicle or otherwise violates any of the provisions set forth in Section B 1 through 13 after a hearing upon due notice to the tow provider. This hearing

shall be conducted by the Chief of Police or his designee. If a finding is rendered suspending or revoking the tow provider's privileges under the terms and conditions of this policy then the tow provider will receive notice of the suspension or revocation by certified mail. The tow provider has the right to appeal the decision by the Chief of Police or his designee to the Police Commission within (10) days of the receipt of the notice of suspension or revocation.

B. Cases for suspension or revocation will be, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of the general, equipment or operating requirements of this policy;**
- 2. Refusal to respond to any call;**
- 3. Failure to respond to any call within (20) minutes;**
- 4. Three "no answers" to telephone calls in a three (3) month period;**
- 5. Overcharging for towing, repairs, or storage;**
- 6. Any ill or unjustified treatment of the motorist requesting services;**
- 7. Suspension of License for Repair of Motor Vehicles;**
- 8. Collusion with any person employed by the Police Department, which would violate the fair and equitable distribution of calls;**
- 9. Substantiated consumer complaints regarding the improper handling of personal property;**
- 10. Conviction of any felony or other offense relating to the tow operation;**
- 11. Non-payment of inspection or license fees;**
- 12. Failure to provide a list of tow operators or new operators;**
- 13. The failure of any applicant or facility, or employee thereof, to assist any member of the Department or other law enforcement officer during an investigation conducted with regard to the operation of a wrecker, the rendering of tow services pursuant to a call from the Department or an investigation conducted relating to the equipment or premises of the tower.**

VI. ROTATING SERVICE

- A. A record of all calls for wrecker service shall be maintained by the shift dispatcher and shall contain the date, time, tower, and case number for each request. This information shall be available for examination by REQUEST.

VII. PROVISIONS

- A. A copy of this policy will be given to each tow operator on the Trumbull Police Department's tow list. Each tow operator shall review the tow policy and provide written acknowledgement that he has read the towing policy and that he understands and consents to the provisions of said policy and the penalties for non-compliance which includes possible suspension or revocation from the towing list.
- B. This policy may be modified or otherwise amended by the Police Commission and all tow operators will be informed of any modifications or amendments to the towing policy.
- C. Any new power or authority given to the Chief of Police herein may be exercised by an officer of the Department designated by the Chief of Police.
